### **Communing with our Horses**

In 2010, Dr. Oz declared Reiki his No. 1 alternative medicine secret. With 40 percent of Americans having tried alternative medicine – and 60 percent of U.S. homes housing at least one animal companion – many people are increasingly turning to Reiki and other holistic therapies to help their animals. As a result of Reiki's increasing popularity, many holistic veterinarians now offer Reiki and other energy healing options (like acupuncture, featured in the last newsletter).

Reiki literally means "spiritual energy" and refers to a Japanese holistic healing system that uses specific Japanese meditative, breathing, and other practices to support energetic rebalancing and the self-healing process. Reiki, because it is holistic in nature, can address any issue at any level: physically, mentally/emotionally, and spiritually. It is an ideal therapy to use with animals, because it is gentle, painless, and stress-free. Reiki does not require direct physical contact in order to be effective and allows animals to choose their level of participating and acceptance of the energy.

Reiki can speed healing after surgery or illness, reduce side-effects of medicine and other treatments, relieve pain, improve behavior problems, heal anxiety-related issues, and when physical healing is not possible, ease the transition of the animal back into Spirit form. Reiki may address the issue(s) that a practitioner thought needed healing, or it may travel somewhere else. Healing energy (like Reiki) goes like a magnet to the origin of the issue(s) without the practitioner needing to know the problem. Reiki can safely be used on its own, or as a wonderful complement to other healing therapies, both allopathic and holistic.

Kathleen Prasad (founding pioneer in the field of animal Reiki) co-founded the Shelter Animal Reiki Association (SARA), the only non-profit of its kind, dedicated to training animal caregivers worldwide. Reiki is a visual testimonial to animals being sentient. Broadly speaking, it denotes beings with consciousness or sentience choosing to participate in a Reiki session. Skeptics often become interested in learning more about Reiki when they see an animal receive a treatment. During the Shoden and Animal Reiki Training (The Basics course and Equine Reiki Training at HPL) the students could see the horses participate in Reiki. Here's an example from one of the participants, HPL President Annie Oden: *Much to my surprise, my horse Spirit chose to lie down and enjoy a deep Reiki slumber. The other five boarders along with Lenny, Pearl, and Striker were all standing motionless, noses almost touching the ground. Even a little bunny stood at my side!* 

# Reiki

A holistic approach to healing

During another practice session with the horses, Carol Miyagishima had this experience with Annie's horse, Spirit: I began to see little black dots, but brushed it off as vitreous eye floaters that I frequently experience. The dots were on the coronary bands of both front feet and one on a rear foot. At the time, I did not attach any significance to it. Later, I realized the dots corresponded to acupressure ting points of the horse. When we discussed Carol's insights at the next class, we learned from Annie that Spirit's lameness issues had resolved. Reiki goes where it needs to for the Greater Good of All. It is spiritual energy, which activated acupressure ting points in Spirit's legs helping to resolve her lameness.

Here's another example of a horse at HPL benefiting from a student experience during a Reiki class. Judy Lami mentioned this about Blaze: He stood very close to me, so I scratched his neck and shoulders. He began to yawn over and over and over again. With elderly horses, it's best to scratch and massage the horse during Reiki, talking to them a bit, to help keep them aware and stable while offering Reiki. Blaze's excessive yawning indicates an acceptance of the Reiki to support energetic rebalancing and the self-healing process. The very next day, Blaze was grazing in the pasture – something he had not been able to do for quite some time due to the arthritis in his neck. Barbara Albright noticed during class sessions: Nearly all of the horses have been eager participants. Some have pounded and rattled their rails and gates to get our attention and encourage us to come closer for a Reiki session. Many have watched and called out to us as we left to return to our ranch house classroom.

Horses may come to places like HPL feeling stressed, insecure, and unsure of themselves. Reiki can help them trust their caregivers and feel something they may never have experienced before – love. As much as we desire to "rescue" animals from a variety of situations, what we soon find is that the animals actually rescue us as well. They enrich our lives and make us better people by teaching us profound lessons in courage, forgiveness, hope, and more. Reiki is a special way to deepen our interspecies bond and remember we are all connected in the web of life. Reiki nurtures compassion within us, for our own healing, and for the support of others as well. Every part of the system of Reiki is ultimately about meditation and compassion as keys to healing.

Jory Weber writes: By practicing Reiki meditation each day with my horses (even for just a few minutes), time seems to slow down. Normally when thinking of what needs to be done, I look at the clock and go, "Yikes, it's getting late!!!" Now, it seems that I have more time and am not so worn out at the end of the day.



# Just another way HPL survives... Grants

Two members of our grant-writing committee attended Grant Proposal Writing classes presented by Jay Katz of Colorado Grants. The classes provided our grant writers a greater understanding and appreciation of the grant writing process.

Actual writing of the proposal is preceded by detailed research, planning, and budgeting. For HPL, there are several key elements that must be considered when applying for grant funds:

- We must find funders whose focus area, mission statements, and goals match our own.
- We need to let funders know how they will be publicly acknowledged for their generous contributions.

- Proof of expert/professional input is essential when technical plans are involved.
- 4) We must provide proof that we are sustainable. Fortunately, HPL has more than 20 years of continuous service in the Horse Rescue field. Furthermore, we can combine granted funds with our own fund-raising activities such as sponsorships, events, memberships, donations, etc.
- 5) It is crucial to provide detailed analysis on how requested funds will be used and how they fit in with our current budget.
- 6) We need to show how we assist the Community and how the Community supports our goals.


The Horse Protection League has, indeed, been fortunate to have been the recipient of several generous grants and contributions that have helped us care for our horses and ranch property.


All sorts of things need to happen behind the scenes to make any fund-raising event successful. Somehow, it all seems to come together the day of the event!

### Can You Identify the HPL Horse?

Individual facial markings of a horse help to identify him or her. Each marking has a special name which is universal among equine aficionados. The most common horse facial markings are identified below<sup>2</sup>. Can you name a HPL horse that fits these markings? Answers on page 11.

- ♦ Star: White spot on the forehead.
- Blaze: Wide white area that runs along the bridge of the nose.
- Bald: White that starts above the forehead, goes to the muzzle, and extends beyond the bridge of the nose to the side of the face.
- Snip: White spot located on the muzzle, between or just below the nostrils.
- ♦ Stripe: Narrow white stripe down the center of the face, on the bridge of the nose.


