 This year was another productive and prosperous year for The Horse Protection League!

Through special events, horse sponsorships, memorials, grants, donations, adoptions, and other fundraising activities, HPL raised over \$165,000 which covered a significant portion of the costs associated with operating the ranch for the year.

Although there still is work to be done, a number of improvements were completed at the ranch. Just to name a few: upgrades to deteriorating horse sheds, a new concrete pit to make disposing of horse waste safer and more efficient, and the addition of new gates and locks in some pens.

Rejoicing

One of HPL's primary objectives for 2015 was to place the adoptable horses in forever homes. HPL is elated to report that 6 of our horses were adopted and are now living in loving homes! Photos of the horses and their adoptive owners can be found on page 10 of this newsletter. In addition, one of HPL's horses was safe-homed as a companion horse over the summer. As horses were adopted out, HPL also gained some new residents. Take a look on the next two pages...there may be a horse just for you!




Renewing

Bella, stands 16 hands and is an 11-year old mare, Paint draft/cross. She was previously used for trail riding and is shown above being ridden by Tucker Black at the HPL ranch. She is very calm and not easily spooked. Bella is in good health, has good feet and no lameness. She loves people and wants a new home where she can be ridden and loved.

Amigo is a 24-year old, Bay Quarter Horse. He has been boarded at HPL, but has become adoptable due to the passing of his owner. He is very friendly, and is in riding shape.

Maya a black Arabian, is thought to be around 31 years old. Maya was brought to us through the Arvada Animal Control as an owner surrender. She was kept in horrible conditions, confined in a small pen and neglected. She is very sweet.

Jackie came from Jefferson County Animal Control very underweight and in overall poor health. She has trust issues and needs a calm but confident handler that provides reassurance and love. Companion only due to weak chest muscles which causes her to cross her front legs when riding. She stands to be haltered, brushed, and has very nice ground manners. Born 1993, Arabian mare.

Romeo came to HPL in 2003 from an owner surrender who unfortunately could no longer care for him. He is a handsome and proud Arabian. Romeo was shown in Level 2 Dressage. Even though he is no longer rideable, he loves groundwork and has good ground manners. An ideal home for Romeo would be one with other companions and a lot of love.

Blaze—On the verge of starvation, Blaze arrived at HPL on May 1, 2014 underweight by 400 pounds. Blaze continues his road to recovery and is now receiving additional treatment for a stiff neck. Blaze's current condition keeps on improving!

5 years old, Mustang, gelding Adoption Fee - TBD






Adoption Fee - \$300



The Benefits of Equine Massage and Body Work

Shelley Ferraro, the owner of Equine Response Therapy (ERT) is a Certified Equine Massage Therapist through the Masterson Method Program and Carol Miyagishima is an HPL volunteer and student of the Masterson Method. Carol and Shelley began doing bodywork with HPL horses on November 3, 2015 and have visited HPL four times and have worked on a total of 5 different horses (Blaze, Maya, Ranger, Jackie and Billy) with Blaze receiving bodywork each visit.

ERT is unlike traditional massage therapy, it is non-invasive and uses energy through gentle humane touch to communicate with the horse's nervous system and only addresses the superficial muscles and connective tissue/fascia of the horse while in a relaxed state. The HPL horses demonstrate to the therapist where there is restriction in their bodies and they also show when restriction is released by a number of mannerisms such as, yawing, snorting, deep sighs, passing of gas, licking and chewing etc.

I (Shelley) have worked on Blaze 3 times now. Blaze has had such a hard and abusive life and has little trust in humans so when working with Blaze it is most important that we the practitioners honor what Blaze wants or is willing to accept in the bodywork being done to him at the time. While working on Blaze, essential oils were used to help him to relax emotionally and also to help with the tightness in his body. Carol and I used Dr. Bradley Nelson's "Emotional Code" technique with Blaze to see if he had any trapped emotions that he was willing to release that day and kept a record of those emotions he was willing to release.

Blaze appears to be very restricted in his poll, along his cervical vertebra in his neck and in his lumbar and sacrum area. Really this sweet fellow is obviously sore and restricted most everywhere in his poor old body. It breaks my heart just to watch him walk.

My intention was to work with Blaze's nervous system and to soften the fascia and muscles so that the skeleton can softly re-adjust itself back to where they should naturally be if that is possible for him at his age and with all the harsh treatment he has had to endure over his lifetime. As practitioners, sometimes all we can do is to make them more comfortable at this late stage of their life.

I did some cranial sacral work on Blaze which helps to relieve pressure in the sutures of his skull, sometimes horses do have headaches. Blaze is very afraid of having his

poll or head touched due to years of restriction and most probably heavy hands on his face and bit. When the muscles and fascia are tight it restricts the movement of the skeletal system. I've been working on elevating Blaze's head in order to relax and shorten the poll muscles and to help him to be able to extend his head and neck a bit more freely. This is a very effective technique for Blaze and he gladly lets his head rest on my shoulder which is shortening all his poll muscles and allowing them to relax which obviously felt very good to this sweet fellow. He closed his eyes and simply could have gone to sleep.

Light bodywork was done on Blaze and only in the areas that Blaze felt safe being touched. I had good results just softly working with the cervicals in his neck gently encouraging him to have a better range of motion. He will need continued work in this area since he has been restricted for so long. Since Blaze was so nervous about being touched on his poll area I decided to work on his hind end; to better explain, when you release the poll you also release the sacrum, when you work on releasing the sacrum you are also releasing the restriction in the poll at the same time (kind of like two for the price of one). Blaze responds beautifully to having his hind end worked on and gives many releases when doing these techniques. Blaze truly loves the hind end work and you don't even have to have a halter on him.

There are a number of things I would like to accomplish with Blaze but I will have to earn his trust before I can touch those areas. This work is like peeling away the skin of an onion and takes time to get to the issues. Right now I'm most probably just addressing secondary issues that have come about since the primary issues for this sweet fellow were never taken care of or addressed. Hopefully in time I might be able to do some work with his scapula (shoulder area) and legs that could bring some relief to his body, but for now this is one of the areas he's terribly nervous about so I'll just need to wait unit Blaze gives me the go ahead.

I would like to thank HPL for allowing me to work on these wonderful creatures and consider it such a great privilege. Blaze has most certainly taken a pretty big spot in my heart. I will work on him as often as I can (weather permitting) and truly hope that I can bring some relief physically and emotional to precious Blaze.




