
#### DRIFTER

### Your Memberships & Donations



Keeping in mind that 100% of the money contributed to HPL is used for the health and welfare of our horses, ponies and donkeys (maybe a mule some day), and that every cent of money received is 100% appreciated, ARE MEMBERSHIPS ALWAYS DONATIONS? The answer is an easy YES! On the other hand, ARE DONATIONS ALWAYS MEMBERSHIPS? This answer is a more complicated NOT FXACTLY.

Memberships are vital to HPL's existence. Memberships give HPL the opportunity to: share news of every kind with caring individuals, families and groups; recruit volunteers; promote great events and fund-raising activities; request occasional donations in difficult or special situations; and enable us to express our gratitude when members generously support our horses.

On a more technical note, memberships provide voters for the annual meeting—anyone seeking a position on the Board must have a minimum of 10 votes in order to be elected. Memberships provide HPL with a steady source of income so that it remains a healthy organization. Also, when HPL applies for a grant, a good number of memberships may be a deciding factor in whether or not the grant is given. This may appear to be counterintuitive, but an organization needs to show, through memberships, that it will be viable in the long term and thus be worthy of receiving a grant.

For all of these reasons, new/renewing memberships are of primary importance to HPL. Timing is important, too, so that, once you have a membership, it doesn't expire. When you receive a renewal reminder card, please send it back with "renewal" written on the memo line of your check. If you use PayPal or another form of payment, write "renewal" if there is a place to do so. Whether you make only one donation (remember, a membership IS a donation) a year or many, designating all or part of a donation for a new or renewing membership, at any level, will have the HPL herd kicking up its heels for joy. The horses will be happy, too!



# Fond Memories Of Our Stormy

It was in 2010 when the Norwegian Fiord walked over to greet me. I'd seen pictures of the breed but had never met one in person. Stormy was handsome with his distinctive brush mane and thick tail of light cream, both divided by a black stripe.

What struck me most was his friendly nature and soft brown eyes, sometimes partially hidden by his long, thick forelock.

When anyone approached he always came over to investigate and 'say hello'.

Participating in a handling class offered by our knowledgeable barn manager is a requirement for certain aspects of contact with HPL horses. I chose Stormy as my partner for the class. "He can have a mind of his own," I was told. That did not deter me from working with my 'new friend'. He did, indeed, have a mind of his own as I soon discovered. This very strong small draft horse easily took me to any weed or patch of grass he desired, until I learned proper handling. Even then, he sometimes got his way.

Stormy won the hearts of everyone at the ranch. Some of us occasionally gave grooming lessons with Stormy to small groups of children whose interest blossomed into delighted smiles and exclamations as each one brushed our gentle Fiord. And on hot days during fly season, before heading home, I always made one last trip to the barn to fetch the fly spray for my special pal.

Stormy developed a health issue, which worsened and could not be fixed. Sadly for us, we lost our Stormy in late December. It was a sad time. A month later I made the acquaintance of a girl in her late teens. For much of his pre-HPL life Stormy had been a school horse and had been wonderful with youngsters. This girl had been one of his young riders. It was on Stormy's back that this young lady had learned to ride and nurture her affinity for horses. "He had a mind of his own," she told me. "When Stormy decided lessons should be over, he'd simply walk back to his stall in the barn - with the kid still on his back." I smiled and replied, "That's our Stormy".

# The "Other" All-Volunteer Army By Stan Dyer

Don't get me wrong. I absolutely appreciate everything the "All Volunteer" armed forces do to keep this nation safe and secure. They volunteer their commitment, and often risk their lives as a result, but, in the end, they are compensated for their efforts with a certain amount of money, benefit, and recognition. There does, however, exist in this county another "All Volunteer" army that I am just as proud of for having the same dedication and commitment, but expecting no more in return than the simple, good feeling that comes from doing good in their community, and having the heart to lend a helping hand where needed. This other army is the Army of Volunteers, and, in particular, the one special unit of that army that mans the post at the Horse Protection League.

Anyone who spends any amount of time in research will discover that the Horse Protection League is managed, run, and kept going entirely by the efforts of volunteers. Even knowing that information, it is still difficult to look around at what they do, and image that this could be true, but it is.

For an HPL horse, the initial rescue is more than just the beginning, and certainly not the end. Before a rescue can occur, there has to be someone making the inquiries, looking for the animals or manning the phones in case a call comes in. That someone is a volunteer. Then, other volunteers will help assess the situation, and determine what can be done in the best interests of the animal. If it is decided that the horse will come to the facility, other volunteers will be secured to transport the animal safely to its new, temporary home.

Upon arrival at the HPL, the horse must then be accommodated, fed, watered, cleaned up after, cared for, groomed, comforted, and adequately trained on its way to adoption. It's a big job, especially since most of this must be done on a daily basis, and all of this requires time, money, equipment, donations, and, most of all, the devoted attention of an entire army volunteer staff. And, like an army, all the players know and play their roles to perfection.

There is a volunteer night sentry who watches over the animals by night, provides for their short-term needs, and deals with any eventuality that may arise.

Then, when the Sun comes up, one of 14 voluntary feeding teams arrives to make sure each animal is fed according to specific, veterinary instruction. The animals are fed both morning and evening.

There are other volunteers in the army who make certain the animals have fresh water, that their water tanks are clean, and that there are no obstructions to the water like any layer of ice that may build up on the surface of the tanks. At any time, all of these volunteers are on the lookout for problems with the horses, unknown injuries, or other concerns that need to be shared and corrected.

Pens also have to be kept clean, and yet another division of the army is assigned that task. They come in at specified times to clean out any waste that may accumulate. Some of these people also pick and clean the hooves of the horses before taking them out to the big pasture where they can run free, and get the exercise they need. Then, when the animals come back in, they are brushed, groomed, and returned to freshly cleaned pens.

The duties of the volunteers do not stop with the normal day to day. There are some things that only money can provide, and for that, the volunteers involve themselves in fundraisers that include collecting and recycling aluminum for cash, garage sales, tack sales, benefits, and securing donations. Some volunteers don't have as much time as others, so they offer what they can during these endeavors, or with donations from their checking accounts. It's all needed, all appreciated, and all put to good use.

For the horses, the HPL is not entirely a "Summer Camp," or a "Vacation in the Bahamas," either. They also undergo the training and assimilation needed for success after adoption. While they are undergoing this training, they may from time to time be called upon to give back just a little by lending themselves as subjects to show young horsemen and horsewomen the fine art of grooming and caring for an equine friend – young people who might not otherwise have the opportunity. Some horses may be called upon to assist veterinary students in their education, too. The Horses even offer their talents as "therapy horses," helping different groups of people, including veterans, to connect or reconnect with life.

The ultimate goal, the happiest day, and the one thing this army of volunteers works for is that one day when a horse is connected with, and given to an adopted family in a new, life-long home. When a horse that may have been near death's door just a few months ago is relocated to a caring home, it makes all the effort, and all the expense well worthwhile. Whether they become companion animals for other horses, or just companions for special people or families who can give them the care and attention they need, it is a mission accomplished, and another job well done for this "other" All Volunteer Army.


