Gypsy is a Kentucky Mountain gaited pony. She is being ridden every week by one of our young and gifted riders who volunteers at the ranch. Gypsy is an 8-year old mare and is ready for a home with an experienced rider. Come take a look!

Oscar is a 5-year old Pinto Paint gelding. He has received 60 days of professional training during his stay at HPL, but has never been ridden. Oscar needs someone who is willing to grow and learn with him!

**Princess** a 14-year old mare, miniature horse is the smallest equine at HPL. She is only 9:2 hands in height, but she is very large in personality! She represents HPL at events and parades, and is sometimes driven in her cart, to the delight of the onlookers. She loves the attention and is used in many of the children and adult educational programs at the ranch.



**Willy** was taken from his owner by Jefferson County Animal Control. He has Cushing's (over active adrenal gland, affects the coat and eating conditions) and COPD (chronic obstruction pulmonary disease) and requires extra medical attention. He is HPL's oldest resident in his early 30's. Willy loves to eat and is a sweet boy.



**Daisy**, on the left, is 3 years old and was the first donkey to arrive at HPL. She was rescued at Canyon City through the Bureau of Land Management adoption program. She loves to be groomed and loves attention.

Millie, on the right, is 4 years old and came from Long Hopes Donkey Rescue in Colorado. She was saved by them from being slaughtered. She loves to talk, is easy to handle and loves attention.

Both are Jennet Burros (Donkeys) and are used in many of HPL's educational programs.

**Billy** originally came to HPL in 1996, but was returned to HPL with Badger and Bailey in 2006 due to owner surrender. Special farrier care is needed. Billy is helpful with the Vet Tech Internship Program, school tours and education programs. Big boy with a big heart!

27 years old, Appendix gelding. Size: 16 hh, Adoption Fee - \$100



**Jackie** came from Jefferson County Animal Control very underweight and in overall poor health. She has trust issues and needs a calm but confident handler that provides reassurance and love. Companion only due to weak chest muscles which causes her to cross her front legs when riding which could be dangerous because of tripping. She stands to be haltered, brushed, and has very nice ground manners.

Born 1993, Arabian mare, Adoption Fee - \$200



Romeo came to HPL in 2003 as an owner surrender who, unfortunately could no longer care for him. He is a handsome and proud Arabian. Romeo was shown in Level 2 Dressage. Even though he is no longer rideable, he loves groundwork and has good ground manners. An ideal home for Romeo would be one with other companions and a lot of love.

Hobbs is a Paint Shetland pony and came to HPL originally in the fall of 2005. He and another pony had been abandoned by their owner. In December 2007, Hobbs was adopted to become a companion to a lonely goat who had lost his horse buddy. He lived happily until both the goat and his owner passed away and he returned to HPL.

Chance arrived at HPL in May of 2009, along with Striker, both 9-10 month old mustangs and both in critical condition. They were part of a large rescue of mustangs from the 3 Strikes Ranch near Alliance, NE, where 74 of nearly 250 mustangs had been found dead from starvation. Chance was adopted as a yearling, but circumstances forced his return to HPL.

### Happy Meals for Horses

Are you worried about taking off those extra pounds that silently crept upon you before the summer swimsuit season? Well, eating healthy, staying fit and looking good are also important to our horses, even if they find immense pleasure in rolling around in the mud!

That's why our feeder program at HPL is so important! Some of the horses we bring to the ranch are dreadfully malnourished, and require special diets and medication to help get them back on

their feet and strong enough to fully recover.

Thanks to our volunteers who understand the importance of adhering to the daily dietary requirements of our horses.

13,140 meals are prepared

and provide for our hors-

es each year. That is 730 (not including

lunch rations) meals per horse, per year. That means the feeder team members should be called Executive Chefs! The feeders that face snow, ice, subzero temps and wind (that is just on the drive to the ranch) during our Colorado winters are a critical part of the Horse Care Team at HPL. Feeders take time out of their busy lives, often more than once a week to come to the ranch and not only to feed our horses, but to spend time with them and ensure they are happy and healthy.

Feeders are often the first people to see our horses in the morning and the last people to see them at night. Their keen sense of each horse and their mannerisms enable feeders to know when one is not feeling well or seems abnormal. Our feeders are everyday people

that have been trained to notice when

something doesn't seem right. We train our feeders and make sure they are comfortable with the horses, going in and out of the paddocks, and making the grain. We are always looking to add to our team and if you are interested, please email hplfeeder@yahoo.com.

## Acupuncture

Treating the whole patient using multimodal integrated medicine.

#### As many of you may be aware,

about a month ago our dear Blaze was not eating his meals with his normal vigor and enthusiasm. He initially seemed like he wanted to eat and was excited about meals, yet he would leave his food virtually untouched. This was quite unusual for our now plump Blaze and raised flags with Emie and the feeders. When further investigation and examinations were done it was found that Blaze had a very stiff neck and it was too painful for him to place his head down in order to eat off of the ground. Emie and crew immediately started to feed Blaze in elevated feeders and even raised his water tank. When I examined Blaze he was very stiff in his neck vertebrae in his mid to lower neck as well as very painful in the muscles. The bones

were even a bit "locked up" in these locations. No wonder poor Blaze could not, would not place his head down to eat. A combined medical management plan was immediately initiated utilizing pain relievers, acupuncture and chiropractics. Radiographs were taken and arthritis was found in Blaze's neck.

Why, some may ask, all of these treatments for a stiff neck? The truth is the more we can treat a problem like this from multiple directions the faster the patient improves. Okay the pain reliever makes sense. But why both acupuncture and chiropractics? Well they work very differently and very complimentary to each other. Very briefly chiropractics takes a "locked up" bone or a bone with a subluxation (mildly shifted out of normal location) and manually forces it back into alignment. This can be great but what about the rest of the body structures that tightened around the incorrectly positioned bone? Well often they pull

the bone back into that unaligned state, and more adjustments are needed. This is where acupuncture comes to the rescue. No I cannot put the bone back into alignment with an acupuncture needle,

but I can help keep it there longer by treating the soft tissues around the bone.

Here are a few features about the magic of an acupuncture needle


in Blaze's particular case. First acupuncture needles help stimulate the nerve endings and release trigger points (knots) in

tight muscles. This helps relax the tight and sore muscles that are pulling the bones out of alignment. If we can get those muscles

relaxed then they will displace the bones less and help a chiropractic adjustment last long-

er. Next acupuncture needles help reduce pain by disrupting wind up and triggering release of natural pain relieving agents within the body. This helps both the muscles and the arthritic changes. Third the needles also help decrease inflammation within the affected treatment area and help restore balance within the body. This is a pretty amazing list of accomplishments for a tiny little needle, but we are not quite done with our needs to treat ALL of Blaze. To help our treatments last longer, electro acupuncture is utilized to amplify the effects of the little acupuncture needle. Additionally, I have recommended a series of stretches to help Blaze keep and improve his neck flexibility and range of motion. These stretches and massage have been carried out by the wonderful caretakers and volunteers that work with Blaze on a routine bases.

from all of theses treatments. He will just need us less often as he is doing better on his own. Utilizing this broad, multimodal approach will keep Blaze the happy boy he deserves to be.





As promised in the last newsletter, we want you, our members, sponsors, donors and volunteers, to have a look into what it takes to operate The Horse Protection League on an annual basis. Below is a glimpse of some of the costs incurred during 2014.

Based on current and ever-changing costs, the 2014 annual average cost to care for one healthy horse started around \$2,350.

#### What did it cost us?

The Horse Protection League spent \$199,040 in 2014 housing, caring for, and rehabilitating 29 horses, ponies and donkeys. Looking at this a number of ways, to operate the ranch for that year and care for the horses, it cost an average of \$6,596 per horse, or \$15,940 per month, or \$524 per day.
